What's Next, Downtown?

Downtown Des Moines has been the recipient of unprecedented investment in the past decade. Nearly\$2.8 billion dollars have been spent on a broad range of downtown projects since the turn of the millennium in this metropolitan area with a population of about half million people. Visionary ambitions outlined by several significant planning efforts in the 1980-1990's, including the Des Moines Vision Plan and the Major Projects Task Force findings, inspired a wave of investment in civic, commercial, residential, infrastructure and recreational projects, and spurred a sense of collaboration among the business community, the City of Des Moines, and Polk County. This collaborative spirit, paired with the momentum of recent successes, has produced a shared desire to understand the implications of this recent downtown activity, capitalize on the investments, and plan for new opportunities.



What's Next, Downtown? is a cosponsored study by the City of Des Moines, Polk County, and Downtown Community Alliance. These groups collectively recognized the accomplishments that have been made as well as the potential of our downtown. This project comes at a juncture where people from across the city, metropolitan, state and region are beginning to look at this thriving urban area for much more than its traditional role as an employment center. In addition to providing approximately 70,000 jobs, downtown Des Moines is now home to several thousand



residents and, with such venues as the Iowa Events Center, Principal Park, the Brenton Skating Plaza, Court Avenue, the Civic Center of Greater Des Moines and Gateway Park, it also serves as a regional entertainment center and visitor destination.

What's Next, Downtown

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Utilizing the foundations of Des Moines' earliest planning, this planning project builds on the unique and exemplary 20th Century urban structure with Locust Street's view to the State Capitol, Court Avenue's focus on the Polk County Courthouse and our civic Des Moines Riverfront. The downtown plan supports existing downtown amenities, aiming to bolster their utilization, while proposing initiatives in two categories: movement and development.

Movement initiatives generally address the ways which people get around downtown and move between places in the city. Typically, these proposals are associated with public sector investment or public-private collaboration. *Movement* proposals include:

<u>Walnut Street Transformation.</u> This proposal provides a segue into greater transportation options in downtown. Walnut Street spans the east-west dimension of downtown; for eight of its approximately thirty blocks, it is currently dedicated to a metropolitan bus transit mall. *Walnut Street Transformation* proposes relocating the transit mall to a downtown transit center and returning Walnut Street to a conventional urban street that becomes a "movement spine" through the downtown and includes active mixed use ground floor development, a downtown tram, bike lanes, 2-way traffic, on-street parking, a renewed landscape, and vertical skywalk access points.

<u>Skywalks & Sidewalks.</u> The 3-mile downtown skywalk system is approaching its thirtieth anniversary. This section of the plan proposes a thorough modernization plan, extensions of the system, and a network of public vertical access points that clearly connect the skywalk and sidewalk levels. This section also proposes priority streets for pedestrian improvements.

<u>Greening Downtown.</u> This proposal includes initiatives to link nearby neighborhoods and the vast Central Iowa Trails network to a new system of downtown bike lanes, to create a network of parks that provide active and passive uses, and to expand the ambitious Riverwalk that is currently under construction.

Development initiatives are more speculative in nature. They generally address private sector response to a number of conditions, including recent investments in the downtown as well as those proposed in the *Movement* section. *Development* initiatives include:

The conference title, "Transitions in Planning," reflects the changing nature of planning issues: every day, planners are confronting dynamic policy issues such as housing, the environment, and transportation, and finding they need cross-disciplinary skills to do their jobs well.

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<u>Downtown as a Business Hub.</u> Various areas and investments in downtown create a spectrum of business development opportunities. This section discusses the strengths and potential for commercial business development in four distinct areas of downtown.

Living Downtown. Downtown Des Moines has doubled its residential population in recent years. With this critical mass, *living downtown* identifies downtown neighborhoods where it is possible to develop unique identity through existing and future development. This section discusses the need for urban amenities such as education, transportation options, retail and services, and parks to foster further residential development.

<u>Cultural Development</u>. This section recognizes the significant recent investments in cultural places in downtown and recommends focusing future cultural amenities along strategic routes in an effort to better connect the network of cultural places. This infill strategy is intended to enhance the experience of moving through downtown and effectively draw scattered places closer together.

A *District Development* section begins the exploration of deploying these initiatives in the various areas of downtown and offers planning and design guidelines particular to conditions in downtown Des Moines. The plan concludes with an outline of priorities, aiming to inform the future agenda of downtown organizations and their leaders.

The contribution of the downtown plan ideas is the way that they will significantly alter how people use our downtown area and the many opportunities it offers. These initiatives will enhance our downtown and prepare Des Moines for economic, social, environmental, and cultural advances that will benefit future generations. Much progress has been made in downtown Des Moines; much is left to do. *What's Next, Downtown*?imagines how current and future generations will use our downtown with the proposed initiatives.
