Several lowa planners also were able to participate in the APA Policy and Advocacy Conference in September. This conference, also held virtually, focuses on federal legislation that affects planning and mixes traditional conference sessions with training on how to navigate the legislative landscape to advocate effectively. The conference also features a 'Planners' Day on the Hill' component whereby APA members meet with members of Congress and/or their staffs to discuss legislation of importance to planners. For the 2020 Planners' Day on the Hill, APA members focused on transportation reauthorization and planning-led economic recovery.



Affordable Housing Panel

APA Iowa Chapter partnered with Iowa Commission for Latino Affairs during the APA Upper Midwest Planning Conference to bring a panel of experts addressing affordable housing challenges for minorities and low-income populations.

The five panelists included Caleb Knutson as the moderator, Ted Grevstad-Nordbrock, Johnny Alcivar, Kendyl Larson, and Julie Winter. They discussed housing issues ranging from gentrification of Des Moines, lack of funding, rural-specific challenges, and natural disaster housing response.



lowa Public Radio attended the session and provided an overview of the panel. The ultimate takeaway from the panelists was the message that to address the issue of displacement of minority populations and to offer more affordable housing options, government officials must "confront the issues head-on." The panelists went on to say that in order to do that, communities must vote and encourage the state/federal government to invest more funding into neighborhood projects, as well as provide more incentives for developers to create affordable housing options.

PARKS AND RECREATION WHEN YOU'RE RUNNING OUT OF SPACE

Parks and green spaces are invaluable community assets. Unfortunately, communities often run into space limitations when researching suitable locations for new parks. In high-density urban areas, space is downright scarce. In rural areas, though open space is plentiful, farmland preservation codes can prevent the conversion of agricultural land to parkland. Natural limitations including ravines, wetlands, lakes or streams are equally challenging to design around. Yet, communities are getting creative and finding ways to get more bang for their recreational buck – with resulting amenities that boost property value and attract a variety of new residents.

Pocket Parks

These small urban parks — generally under $\frac{1}{4}$ -acre in size — are created on underutilized land or vacant lots.

The Sauk City, Wisconsin, Riverfront Pocket Park was originally a vacant parcel between two buildings. The park includes an ADA-accessible path, places for playing and views of the downtown and Wisconsin River.

Pop-Up Parks

Pop-up parks are temporary park spaces, often located in parking stalls or streets as extensions of sidewalks. Whether used for single events or as evolving installations, pop-up parks challenge the way communities think about public space.

Duchess Plaza is a pop-up park in downtown Wisconsin Dells, located on a closed road. This free entertainment zone features a stage for concerts, café seating and a large, three-dimensional community mural.

Stormwater Management Areas

These areas offer an opportunity for parks to coexist with wetlands, retention ponds or drainage ways in the form of trails, boardwalks or interpretive spaces.

Heron Pond in Belknap, Illinois, provides stormwater management within the Ohio River floodplain. Featuring trails and wetland boardwalks, visitors can view a variety of endangered and threatened plant and animal species up close.

Highly Inclusive Parks


Re-purposing existing space to accommodate a diverse user base, and adding both passive and active places to play, relax, eat, socialize and exercise enhances the enjoyment of public spaces for everyone.

In 2010, Lake Mirror Park in Lakeland, Florida, was transformed from a neglected green space into a 7-acre recreation destination that now accommodates large community events and invites visitors of all ages and abilities to visit.

Public-Private Partnerships

Existing businesses sometimes have underutilized open space on their properties that present an opportunity for publicprivate partnerships.

The Home Depot Backyard in Atlanta, Georgia, is an 11-acre multi-purpose green space that doubles as parking for sporting events while providing free, public green space on off days for community use.





CITY OF DES MOINES, LIVEDSM


RECIPIENT OF THE ADVANCING DIVERSITY & SOCIAL CHANGE AWARD

CITY OF INDIANOLA, ELEVATE INDIANOLA COMPREHENSIVE PLAN


RECIPIENT OF THE DANIEL BURNHAM AWARD FOR A COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

In late 2018, the City of Indianola began its journey towards updating its 2011 Comprehensive Plan. This plan was inspired by, created with, and designed for the people of Indianola. The planning process for Elevate Indianola began by creating a Project Management Team and holding and attending several community events. In addition to in-person public engagement events, an online survey using MetroQuest was distributed to the community and reached over 1,600 participants, representing over 10% of the population of Indianola.

The Elevate Indianola Comprehensive Plan was developed with the theme that this plan was for the entire community. It is truly "comprehensive" in that it addresses issues that extend beyond the direct control of the city government and the responsibility for implementation falls wider than the city hall's doors. Elevate Indianola further utilizes Iowa's Smart Planning Principles as a guide, while focusing on issues specific to Indianola.

CITY OF BONDURANT, REGIONAL COMMERCIAL MASTER PLAN


RECIPIENT OF THE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PLAN AWARD

The Bondurant Regional Commercial Master Plan has proven to be a successful economic development tool that outlines a community-supported vision for the future of Bondurant. The study area covers a portion of Bondurant's frontage along I-80 and identifies the highest and best use of each property that also complements the existing community character.

The master plan makes clear the intent of Bondurant to develop the study area in a manner that provides ample job opportunities, new commercial activity centers and diverse residential offerings connected through a city-backed street and trail system. The design guidelines contained within the plan help ensure the development type, style and density reflect community wishes and seamlessly blend with the rest of the Bondurant.

The Regional Commercial Master Plan shows the development community that Bondurant is a strong partner for growth and development, and the plan has already helped to attract the first Amazon fulfillment center in lowa, which will provide over 1,000 new jobs.

DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY & REGIONAL PLANNING AT IOWA STATE UNIVERSITY, ADEL DOWNTOWN PLAN 2020-2040 RECIPIENT OF THE EXEMPLARY STUDENT PROJECT AWARD

In the fall of 2019, eleven graduate students from the Department of Community and Regional Planning at Iowa State University developed the Adel Downtown Plan 2020-2040 in their Community Planning Studio.

Some communities within the Des Moines metropolitan area are currently growing and looking for ways to enhance the quality of life for their residents. The City of Adel is one of these exceptional small towns. Located to the northwest of Des Moines, Adel is experiencing population growth, and the city wanted to create a plan to attract people to its charming downtown.

Collaboration with the City and its Chamber of Commerce started early in the summer and included four community engagement activities, making the planning process participatory and helping residents understand and embrace the plan. The final plan was adopted on March 10, 2020 by the Adel City Council, and connects aspects of the local economy and history with the surrounding built environment and a variety of recreational activities.

UNIVERSITY OF IOWA SCHOOL OF PLANNING AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS, IOWA CITY AUTOMATED VEHICLES ADAPTATION & EQUITY PLAN RECIPIENT OF THE EXEMPLARY STUDENT PROJECT AWARD

Over the 2018-19 academic year, a team of four students in the Master of Urban and Regional Planning program at the University of Iowa completed an Iowa City Automated Vehicles Adaptation and Equity Plan for Iowa City.

The plan is innovative in both subject matter and scope. The lowa City AV plan is one of very few that addresses the future impacts of automated vehicles with an emphasis on equity.

In creating the plan, the students focused not only on needs of AV technology, such as changes to parking and drop off requirements. They also identified impacts to transit service and ways for the city to move forward with transportation options that benefit all residents, not just those who can afford to purchase an AV for personal use.

Major recommendations and findings from the plan from the plan include: Use of automated neighborhood transit vehicles to act as a feeder service for a reconfigured trunk and branch transit system; Temporary vouchers for private rideshare to extend transit service hours; AV-oriented street designs and reduced parking requirements; and Enhanced pick-up/drop-off zones downtown in conjunction with parking capacity reductions.

Taken together, the recommendations form a blueprint for lowa City to guide future development and integrate AV technology in a way that increases access and opportunity for all. Congratulations to the University of Iowa School of Planning and Public Affairs and the students and faculty that helped create the Iowa City Automated Vehicles Adaptation & Equity Plan!

CITY OF FORT DODGE, THE DES MOINES RIVER DAM REMOVALS

RECIPIENT OF THE IMPLEMENTATION AWARD

The Hydroelectric and Little Dam have been discussion topics in Fort Dodge for decades. Participants at several public outreach events discussed solutions to "the dam issue." Restoring the Hydroelectric Dam, reconstructing both dams as whitewater trails, and full removals were possibilities. Although ecologic, economic, and safety benefits outweighed the consequences, the community valued easy and reliable fishing and were hesitant to see the river change. A robust public engagement plan educated river users who eventually embraced dam removal.



In 2018, Snyder and Associates designed plans to remove the dams and presented a potential funding alternative - the Des Moines River Mitigation Bank. The goal of the Des Moines River Mitigation Bank is to provide income for the City to pay for the dam removals and complete future river improvements.

In January 2019, after decades of "dam" discussion, demolition began at both dams. Material from the Hydroelectric Dam was repurposed to stabilize the riverbanks and construct an in-river feature for recreational uses such as fishing and kayaking. CITY OF WAUKEE,

THE WAUKEE STREET DESIGN GUIDE


RECIPIENT OF THE TRANSPORTATION AWARD

Waukee is a fast-growing community that is part of the Des Moines Metro Area. With an anticipated growth rate that will double the community's size by 2040, the City of Waukee partnered with Snyder & Associates to develop street classifications and standards to provide residents and visitors with improved mobility while also increasing the safety of all road users, motorist, bicyclists, and pedestrians alike.

The City is currently implementing traffic calming elements identified in the Guide on two established Minor Collector streets to address speed concerns expressed by residents along the corridors. "Before" speed and volume data have been collected along both streets and "After" data will be collected for comparison and effectiveness of the selected treatments.

CITY OF MUSCATINE, THE RECONNECTING MUSCATINE PROJECT RECIPIENT OF THE URBAN DESIGN AWARD

Muscatine, Iowa, is rooted in industrial beginnings that shaped the city's growth along the Mississippi River. Mississippi Drive, once a bustling boat and rail yard turned truck route, divided downtown Muscatine from the riverfront.

As the city evolved, the riverfront transformed into a regional amenity with recreational offerings and public open space but was plagued by increasing vehicular traffic and lack of connectivity to downtown. Accessibility challenges, dangerous railroad crossings, and aging infrastructure have historically plagued the 1.6-mile corridor.

Designated as a Blue Zones Project in 2014, the city established an expectation for redefining the priorities of the Mississippi riverfront. The long-term goal was to provide a safe and attractive multimodal streetscape corridor to promote economic development in downtown and encourage more pedestrian and recreational activity along the riverfront.


As part of a phased reconstruction strategy for downtown Muscatine, the city has:

- reimagined Mississippi Drive (1.6 miles),
- developed plans for the reconstruction of Grandview Avenue (2.1 miles),
- is currently reconstructing 2nd Street through the downtown core, and
- is finishing construction on the Mulberry Roundabout.

Together these projects complement one another with the goal of reconnecting Muscatine and its downtown to the Mississippi River.


