



# CHAPTER DEVELOPMENT

#### **Elections**

Chapter consolidated elections were held in August 2021 where chapter members received a ballot via email to cast their vote for executive officers including president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. The following positions will serve two year terms beginning in January 2022.

## **Administrative Support**

2021 was the second year that APA lowa had paid administrative support. The board retained the services of firm Sickels & Associates, an Indianola based company who provided approximately 10 hours of assistance per month. These services included financial management services, meeting management and event coordination, and advisory services to help carry out APA lowa's policies. The board voted in fall 2021 to terminate services with the contractor.

#### 2022 Work Plan

In November 2021 the APA lowa board held a *Strategic Doing* session, facilitated by Liesl Seabert, incoming Chapter Vice President recently certified as a Strategic Doing Facilitator, to help refine the 2022 work plan. Strategic Doing is a discipline of simple rules to form and guide collaborations. It is a discipline that enables participants to form complex collaborations quickly, move them toward measurable outcomes, and make adjustments as they learn by doing. The APA lowa Chapter Board decided to use Strategic Doing to assure the development of a plan that was collaborative and actionable.

Board members identified three primary strategic opportunities to focus on in 2022: be the planning resource for advice, guidance, and learning within lowa; improve upon relationships in the planning community, with you, and with outside organizations; and to improve upon our own operations through messaging, organization, and marketing. Priorities were further developed with metrics related to increased membership, increased awareness, and increased opportunities for engagement.

#### **Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Subcommittee**

In August 2020, the APA lowa chapter formed a new Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Subcommittee to ensure the underrepresented planners had a voice in the chapter and to help APA lowa address DEI goals. The subcommittee meets monthly and has approximately 15 members. The committee has brought attention to important DEI topics and has facilitated the following events for the Chapter Board and Membership:

- September 7-8, 2021 Anti Racism Training for Chapter Executive Board Members facilitated by Dr. Tristen Brenaé Johnson and Tiara Cash, Founder and Owner of Crowned Vitta
- November 18, 2021 Planning on Tap Microaggressions in the Workplace Virtual Panel featuring Caleb Knudson, V Fixmer-Oraix, Liesl Seabert, and Keisha Fields.

The APA Social Media Pages also celebrate underrepresented planners during various months including Iowa female planners (March), Asian American and Pacific Islanders Month (May), Pride Month (June), Hispanic and Latino American Heritage Month (Sept 15-Oct 15) and National Native American Heritage Month (November).

In Spetember, the APA lowa Baord and its DEI Committee participated in an antiracism training. To aid in this training, the Chapter applied for and received a \$2,100 grant from the APA's Chapter President's Council. Diversity, equity, and inclusion efforts are ongoing within the chapter with a focused effort on sharing tools and resources to chapter members through planning on tap training opportunities and a working group has been created to review the Chapter's bylaws to evaluate all aspects of the Chapter's structure but specifically with a DEI lens to ensure opportunities for underrepresented members of the chapter.

The Chapter is promoting the APA new "One Path" program to certification which streamlines the AICP/AICP Candidate process.

## **CM Offerings**

In 2021, APA lowa offered 70 hours of CM opportunities to members, compared with 77 hours offered in 2020. Of these, 40.25 hours were offered directly by APA lowa. Other were offered by partnerships with the Department of Cultural Affairs for the Preserve lowa Conference (23.75 hours), and the University of Iowa (6 hours).

## **CM Partnership Policy**

APA lowa is a registered CM Provider through the American Planning Association and provides this service so that AICP members have ability to receive CM credits throughout lowa, including APA lowa events and conferences. APA lowa frequently partners with other groups and organizations to co-sponsor training events so those events can qualify for CM credits. To partner with other groups to offer CM credits, APA lowa must follow the guidelines set forth in the CM Provider Toolkit.

#### 2021 APA-lowa Chapter Conference

The APA-lowa Chapter Annual Conference was held October 13-15, 2021 in Des Moines at the lowa Event Center as the only in-person programming for the year. The Chapter was able to offer 36.5 Certification Maintenance Credits including Law and Ethics through a variety of programming including:





## **PARTNERSHIPS**

### **Planning on Tap Series**

In 2020 APA lowa embarked on holding monthly events that combined networking and professional development. These events, dubbed "Planning on Tap", were to partner with APA's Divisions to have facilitated discussions focused on a specific topic related to that division, hosted at a brewery or bar. Due to COVID, these events transitioned to Zoom, yet retained the same goal. In 2021, APA lowa continued to host virtual Planning on Tap sessions, partnering with APA Division members, including topics on Technology in Planning and Microaggressions, hosted by the APA lowa-DEI Committee.

APA lowa has identified the Planning on Tap series as the first project outcome from the Strategic Doing exercise completed in November, 2021. In January, 2022, the full monthly schedule of topics and dates were announced to membership, extending into February, 2023. The first three sessions cover topics on water quality, the Infrastructure Bill, and renewable energy.



## **Professional Development Events**

APA Iowa Chapter partnered with the Iowa Department of Cultural Affairs to provide Certification Maintenance Credits during the 2021 Preserve Iowa Summit. The event was held June 3-5 and provides learning opportunities for professionals and volunteers involved in historic preservation.

# **LEGISLATIVE EFFORTS**

## **State Advocacy**

APA lowa annually develops a state legislative agenda and engages in the lowa legislative process when necessary. Periodic updates are made throughout the legislative session to APA lowa members about planning-related legislation making its way through the legislature. When necessary, APA lowa works to educate legislators on the potential planning-related impacts of pending legislation.

Prior to the 2021 Legislative Session, the Chapter contracted with lobbyist firm Cope Murphy + Co to advocate for the Chapter's Legislative Agenda before the Iowa Legislature. The Chapter was able to have a stronger voice in promoting our planning-related priorities. In addition, the lobbyist assisted the Chapter by updating the Board on legislation efforts; he also co-presented a session at the State Conference with the Legislative and Policy Committee Chair about the Iowa legislative process and legislation of interest to planners. The Legislative and Policy Committee will continue to work with the lobbyist to encourage cooperation with allied professional and interest groups and develop relationships with key legislators.

In December, 2021, Legislative and Policy Chair Steven Van Steenhuyse attended the State Legislative Summit in Lansing, Michigan, convened by the National APA Office. This afforded an opportunity to learn about legislative efforts in other states, to compare notes with the legislative chairs of other state chapters, and learn about Federal actions that impact planning at the state level.

## **Federal Advocacy**

APA lowa representatives also engage with peers on a national level regarding planning-related legislation. Each September, APA lowa's President as well as the Legislative and Policy Chair travel to Washington, D.C., to participate in APA's Policy and Advocacy Conference. Due to COVID, this conference was held virtually. A benefit of the virtual conference was that more APA lowa members than usual were able to participate, including in the virtual Day on the Hill in which members were able to meet with their respective representatives, as well as meeting with the Senator's staffs to discuss federal legislation affecting planning and to share planning successes here in lowa.



# **FINANCIAL REPORT FOR 2021**

APA lowa operates on a calendar year schedule, January to December. The following tables summarize APA lowa's finances in 2021. APA lowa included several activities in the 2021 budget that increased costs over previous years. These activities included hiring Chapter Administrative Services, hiring a lobbyist, and engaging in a diversity and equity training for the board. These additional activities compounded with slightly lower conference attendance and higher conference costs associated with the Des Moines venue resulted in the \$5,374.49 deficit shown the following financial report. APA lowa did not renew their contract for Chapter Administrative Services for FY 2022.
